I can't remember when I first was acquainted with Lois. Since we attended the same church, I knew her in the passing by hello status first. Later, she was assigned to visit or otherwise acknowledge me on a monthly basis, at least. During that time, she brought me chicken soup after I had surgery and sent birthday greetings, etc. in addition to monthly visits. Our friendship grew even though she is 22 years older than I am. You might think I looked to her as a mother, but that is not the case. We were friends - going through many of life's experiences together. I'd say we were best friends because she was the kind of friend who brought out and encouraged the best in me.

We enjoyed many of the same things. First, there was Book Club where we traveled around the area on a monthly basis to discuss the assigned book and whether we liked it or not. Unlike some book clubs, we actually discussed the book! We carpoled to get there. When it was my turn to drive, we pressed into my sub-compact car. Having only 2 doors made getting into the back seat an exercise for a gymnast. Lois and another friend who was even older, Shirley Jacobson, competed to be the one who got to ride in the back seat! "But it's my turn!" Shirley would argue. You know neither really wanted to squeeze back there- the goal was to keep the other from being uncomfortable.

Lois and I shared a love of quilting, showing each other our projects and our projects-to-be. Even though she didn't feel very well at times, she would attend an event with me to provide company. One time while we were at the Sewing Expo at the Novi convention center, her blood sugar was out of order so she sat down and gave herself a shot right there in the middle of it all.

Lois' sons lived out of town so I started inviting her to attend our Christmas Eve party. I remember one year that Scott and family went to Utah and James' family came but couldn't stay long and it ended up with Lois and I watching a Christmas movie on the Hallmark Channel. Not much of a party but we enjoyed each other's company. Lois has set the example in several important areas, even though neither of us knew it at the time.

I even went to Rochester, New York to see her after she moved there to be close to her son for the help she would need as she aged. I took the long way (not through Canada) and I called Lois to give updates when I stopped somewhere. She had a better idea about how long it SHOULD take to drive to New York and was so worried about me. I made it safe and relatively sound and we had an excellent visit there. She was slowly getting the driving routes down so she could get around. She had her cat and her son visiting once a week and was active in the senior activities there in the building and had found a quilt group at the library.

I enjoyed her visits when she came back to Michigan for a short time until the travel became too much. I've missed her.

I will always remember this: Lois was the kind of person that you'd invite if you could invite only one.
