At this time, she was playing tennis and golf up to 5 days a week, was the head of the tennis club at her community and was involved in the duplicate bridge club. She was also a skilled chess player. Peggy was extremely strong-willed and did things on her own terms. Rarely, if ever, was she taken advantage of. It would take a very convincing and compelling discussion to persuade her. Growing up, these qualities made a big impact on Sean and I. Even though it was clear that I was going to pursue a career in science, mom always stressed the importance of the arts.
