“ My family & I are saddened by the loss of Phil. He & I were pals/friends starting way back in grade school at SS. Peter & Paul, all throughout high school – and beyond. We grew up in the 60’s & 70’s – a time of innocence & fun for us. Phil had his Lemon Peeler bike & I had my Sears stingray bike – both with banana seats & monkey handlebars - - - and on those machines we covered a lot of miles, shared adventures, explored the wilds of Rouge Park, the Rouge River, different neighborhoods & of course every playground & ball field along the way. We always had our (baseball) gloves hanging on the handlebars & usually a baseball wedged into the frame bars of the bikes – just “in case” we happened upon a ball-game or a game of “strike-outs” needing a couple of players.

Phil was always able & willing to talk to people – even adults. I recall coming upon a worksite where men were digging a basement for a house to be built & we spied some green & blue clay - - - well we just really needed that clay – who wouldn’t! Phil started a conversation with some of the workmen – while I (being shier) just dug out a few handfuls of that clay. Later, we laughed at how savvy & shrewd we were at coming away with that clay.

Phil was the nicest fella – nice to me & all of my family (he even said “hi” to my sisters - - - which I sure didn’t understand - - - after-all they were girls!). We were altar boys together & teammates together. He played all sports (“all sports” back then being: football, baseball & basketball) & was good at all of them – playing CYO (Catholic Youth Organization) in all three for years. Our best athlete back then. In basketball (& this was way before the 3-point line ever came to be) Phil played a power forward position & would let it fly from the corner – hitting nothing but net. He also was a tough fighter under the boards as well.

In the early years of high school, Larry, Phil’s brother, would drive us to football practice in the early summer mornings (which for Larry & Phil meant back-tracking a couple miles just to get me). However, they did it in style since Larry drove a stick shift GTO (I think it was

a GTO) – regardless, for a couple of young guys - getting carted around to deliver us to football practice – it was neat!

And strong - - - man, Phil was strong. In high school he was built like a greyhound – lean, tough steel-like muscles. He was a quarterback on the high school football team & yet, from a bench-press point-of-view, he was stronger than any of the linemen who blocked for him (maybe with the exception of Ray! 😊). He was fun to play sports with – and fun to practice with - - - he would be saying something goofy & funny before a game while he & I warmed up together – just to break-up the nervousness. In high school track he was a shot-putter (among other things) – but a shot-putter! That was tough.

After high school, life took us in different directions & I apologize for having lost touch with Phil – though I have never lost – and will never lose - the memories of my friend: the care-free, innocent, fun time of growing up - - - the hard work effort put in for sports, the privilege of being raised as Catholics & learning to pray to our God - - - & growing into good young men. 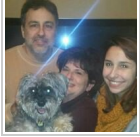
